the survey are part of a single block, actually. But the block is bifurcated by a T-shaped private alley, both east/west and north/south.

Q Is the alley part of the legal description of the land that comprises the site of the Allapattah Trace project?

A Well, the land is described by the underlying platted lots, which do not include the alley.

Q Okay. And is that legal description contained on the boundary survey, as well?

A It is. To the left, just above my signature block is the legal description for the site which describes the platted lots.

Q Do we have some pictures with us today of that strip of land which is the alley?

A We do.
MR. GLAZER: All right. We have marked,
folks, as our Deposition Exhibit 2 the group of
pictures, the first one of which says Northwest
17th at the top. It is a six-page composite exhibit.
Q And Mr. Johnson, let me show you that, and ask you if you can identify what that composite exhibit is, please.

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A Yeah. It's essentially an overhead aerial of the project area, which shows the physical site and an alley and some areas of the surrounding streets.

Q And did you actually take these pictures?
A I took a few of the photos that are taken at street view.

Actually, these are the Google photos.
I've taken some photos, but these particular photos were sourced from Google and Bing.

Q But based on your personal observation, are they -- do they accurately depict the site?

A Yeah. I've been to the site, and I took additional photos, and the imagery that's shown here is consistent with the current site condition.

Q Could you generally describe to us, where is this alley on these pictures?

A Well, the alley runs generally behind the green building. You see the green building at 34th Street and 17th Avenue. And to the east of that are some dozen or so parking stalls. And there's a small area between those parking stalls and the green building which runs north/south. That is the north/south portion of the alley.

Q All right. Why don't you draw a little arrow on that first page to show that.

A Don't have it here. How about I cloud it.
Q Okay. And do the other pictures -- let's look back to Page 4. And tell us what Pages 4,5 and 6 show.

A Page 4,5 and 6 are essentially street views of the alley from the adjacent public streets.

Page 4 is the view from Northwest 35th Street looking south. Page 5 is the view from Northwest 34th Street looking north. And Page 6 is also from Northwest 34th Street looking north.

Q Next l'd like to show you a composite exhibit comprised of 18 pages of pictures, and ask you -- and this has been marked as our deposition Exhibit 3.

First, let me just ask you generally, what is that composite exhibit?

A These are additional photos that I had taken myself of the alley and surrounding areas.

Q And when did you do that?
A Last week.
Q And do they accurately depict the items that are shown in the pictures?

A They do.
Q Okay. I don't want you to walk us page by
page. But if you could generally describe what the
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pictures show, making sure you reference the page numbers as you're giving your general description.

A Pages 1 through 5 are essentially shots north -- looking north and south into the alley, the north/south alley that we've been discussing.

Pages 6 and 7 are shots of the adjacent public street intersections at the site. These are actually at the southwest corner of the site, at 34th Street and 17th Avenue.

Pages 8 through 10 are areas at the south end of the alley where it comes into the public right-of-way of Northwest 34th Street.

Q Let me stop you.
On Page 8 I see a gate. What -- is that -where is that?

A Again, that's at the southerly terminus of the alley, where it meets the public right-of-way of Northwest 35th Street. And is a gate that's attached to the existing building for security and to, you know, close and restrict access into the alley from time to time.

Q And what is Page 9, by the way?
A Pages 9 and 10 essentially show the grooved asphalt. The gate has security pins, so they drag on the asphalt. It just kind of illustrates the gate is,
you know, closed regularly and has, you know, impacted the asphalt surface.

## Q All right. Keep going.

A Pages 11 and 12 are, again, in the same north/south alley segment, looking north and south, just to illustrate the alley condition.

Pages 13 and 14 are at the junction of the east/west and north/south alley portion, which is near our northerly property line, and looks west -- I'm sorry, excuse me -- east into the alley, showing the locked gate for the east/west portion of the alley.

Q Looking back to the boundary survey, can you describe for the record where we find that --

A Yeah. That's --
Q -- chunk?
A -- essentially at the northwest corner of Lot 19. You'll see that there's a 12 -foot annotation, kind of midpoint in the alley. That's just above that area looking to the east.

Photos 15 and 16 are actually at that same gate area peering through to show the east/west alley that's completely blocked.

Pages 17 and 18 are the east terminus of the same east/west alley at the public road, 16th Avenue, I believe it is, which show that that portion of the

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alley is -- is closed and locked by a private gate.
Q Mr. Johnson, we've marked as Deposition Exhibit 4 a sheet where I have duplicated a definition from Florida Administrative Code, Rule 67-48.002, it's 4 Subsection 101, the definition of scattered sites.

And are you familiar with that?
A Iam.
Q All right. In your view, is the Allapattah Trace project located on a scattered site?

A Not based on this definition, no.
Q And tell me why not.
A Because the streets bifurcate -- or the site is bifurcated by a private alley, not a street.

Q And what leads you to believe it's a private alley?

A Well, the -- the plat dedicates the streets, avenues and boulevards on the face of the plat. The alley is not dedicated. So as such, the alley would be -- would be considered private.

Q Okay.
A And as shown in the photos, you know, the alley character is obviously private, as well.

Q And then, finally, Mr. Johnson, do you anticipate being in or within 100 miles of Tallahassee, Florida, during the week of April 29,

A No.
MR. GLAZER: I don't have any further questions right now.
